APRIL - MMM's MONTH OF PRAYER and FASTING

Driving home from the MMM Conference in November of last year, my wife Tania and I were filled with a great sense of excitement about MMM and its future. We had heard inspiring guest speakers from MMM's new International Board and had had in depth conversations with MMM'ers both from within NZ and overseas.

However, we had also heard Bruce Alchin announce he would be relinquishing his role as NZ Director in 2011, this on top of MMM stalwarts like Alan Mitchell, Ernie Pene and Haapi Wilson retiring from their MMM roles. In addition our popular American imports, Andrew and Tracy had indicated they would be returning home early in the New Year.

Given the departure of such valued members of MMM, how could we explain our excitement as we drove home from the conference?

The answer is simple. What man sees as problems, God sees as opportunities!

Don't misunderstand me, MMM is in great heart, however, changes have occurred and we believe that God wants us to look at the way we operate so we can move forward with the personnel and infrastructure in place to handle what we firmly believe will be a greater demand for MMM's services.

Tania and I had an overwhelming sense that 2011 was to be a year of opportunity for MMM but that opportunity would only be birthed through intensive prayer, praise and fasting. So strong was this sense that on my return home, I prepared a paper which I submitted to the MMM Board recommending we dedicate a specific month to prayer and fasting through the MMM network of Management, Staff, Associates, Volunteers and Supporters.

At the MMM Board Retreat held in early February, the Board agreed April 2011 should be designated a Month of Prayer for MMM and we should identify specific prayer points on which prayer is sought. This article is thus the opening salvo!

To begin the Board Retreat I gave a devotional talk based on 2 Chronicles 20. This inspiring scripture tells of a situation facing Jehoshaphat, the King of Judah. He had learned that a vast army was invading Judah, an army which he knew his forces had no chance whatsoever of repelling.

What followed is a testimony of utmost faith and trust in God and in God's provision for his people. Jehoshaphat didn't attempt to solve the issue in his own strength- verse 3 tells us that he "resolved to inquire of the Lord and he proclaimed a fast for all Judah". He called all the people together and proceeded to pray in front of them to his God...and what a prayer of total humility and brokenness it was! He concluded his prayer by confessing before God "we do not know what to do but our eyes are upon you."

God immediately responded to this prayer in an awesome way. He spoke through one of the Judeans who prophesied, "Listen King Jehoshaphat and all who live in Judah and Jerusalem, this is what the Lord says to you, 'do not be afraid or discouraged because of this vast army. For the battle is not yours but God's'"

The principle here is that when the people of God fast and pray, God acts. We see this same principle at work in Acts 13 verse 2. Luke tells us that "whilst they were worshipping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said....." Once again the prayer and fasting triggered action by God.

It is this principle that is behind MMM's decision to make April 2011 a month of prayer and fasting, a month during which we ask and encourage all MMM Staff, Associates, Volunteers and Supporters to fast and pray for specific aspects of MMM's future direction.

From Jehoshaphat's prayer we see that

- he did not give God his solution and ask God to bless it
- he did not even hint that he or the people of Judah had any solution to the problem, quite the opposite; he handed over the entire situation to God.
- he was specific in what he prayed.

Similarly, we believe that MMM must go forward in God's strength and not in our own strength. I am convinced we will see God answering our prayers in wonderful, awe inspiring and most probably, unexpected ways. In 1 John 5 verse 14, John tells us, "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his Will, he hears us."

So, where do we go from here?

1. The format of our monthly Prayer Force for April will be dedicated to issues relating to MMM's future operations. Each day we will list a specific item for which we would love you to pray. (If you don't normally receive the Prayer Force, contact Jenny Halse (07) 871 4161 and she will send you a copy)
2. MMM's workforce will be asked during April to pray during their morning devotional times for these same prayer points
3. The monthly prayer list which goes to MMM's Prayer Fellowship and Supporter groups around the country will, in April, be in a different format and incorporate these same Prayer Points.
4. We will ask all MMM'ers to ask their churches and prayer groups to pray for MMM's Prayer Points during April.

I am truly excited by this initiative and I hope and pray that you also are seeing 'the vision' and will join in with us. If you see other ways in which we can increase the 'cast of our net', please do not hesitate to contact Jenny Halse at MMM.

Work Reports

New Zealand

North Island:

All was completed in time for the new school year. Thanks to Roy Peden who lives in Rotorua for helping the MMM regular team: David Halse, Ian Cross, Rod Heape, Rob and Stephanie Ray. The Principal of the school wrote: " ...we are not only extremely grateful but impressed by the Godly character of each member. Their commitment to the Lord and to MMM is impressive! Nothing phased them, they were gracious, flexible, helpful, skilful and responsive to any task. They even labored long into the evening to maximize the available time. When they left on Friday the College could start in the needed rooms and has given the College a positive start (to the year). May the work of MMM continue to prosper in its service to the Body of Christ, assisting them in the spread of the Gospel of the Kingdom." Graham Preston.



At the beginning of February the Work Team (David Halse, Ian Cross, Rod Heape, and MMM Associates John Baty and Rob and Stephanie Ray) moved up to Auckland to help with a major painting project at the Birkdale Bible Chapel, see picture below. The team painted the exterior of the church, also did some general maintenance work and made alterations to a small accommodation area behind the church. Rod and the Rays continued on at Birkdale for four weeks.



After the first week at Birkdale David and Ian went with a team of volunteers to Ponui Island to work on the Scripture Union Camp. They were assisted by Samuel Aus der Au, Hugh and Margaret Badger, David Bayliss, Mark Gillingham, Maurice Turner and Allan Waldrom. Rose-Mary Hunt did a great job cooking the meals for the team on the wood fired stove. It was very hot weather and food preparation was often done outside, see photo. The team replaced the roof over the kitchen/storage area, built ramps to the boat shed and cleared a back-log of many other small jobs



around the camp. It was a pleasure for the team to work in such beautiful surroundings, swimming, fishing and exploring the island when time allowed. On Saturday 12th February SU held the official opening of the building which MMM had helped build last year. The Work Team stayed on for this occasion and David was invited to share about the work of MMM with those who attended.



The Cornerstone Baptist Church in New Plymouth has been patiently waiting since last year for MMM to find a clear week of fine weather to go and replace the roof of their church office and foyer, then paint the roof of the church and hall. That week came in the middle of February. David and Ian went down and began the work and later MMM Board member Doug Carson went down with his Airless Sprayer and helped paint the roof, see photo below. Praise God for perfect weather, although very hot some days.



A week of fine weather was again needed when the team painted the outside of Scripture Union's, 'Crusader Lodge' at Mount Ruapehu, but it wasn't to be. Thanks to a good team of MMMers and SU helpers, most of the work got done. They renewed spouting and inside, painted window frames, doors, and polyurethaned the floors.

South Island:

Since the last magazine MMM has continued to help with a project at Oxford Baptist Church. As well as the extension to the main building; two large windows and two sets of doors were fitted. Andrew and Tracy Frazier and family moved down to the South Island late in 2010 and after a short break Andrew joined the team on this project. Other MMM helpers included: Bart and Muriel Gilmore, David and Joy Kennedy, Neville and Pauline Stewart, Stan Schroder and Stan Zwies. Stan Schroder returned in the New Year to continue the project. Compare the photo on the right to the ones published in the December Issue of MMM NZ NEWS and you will see what a huge amount of work was done.



The first project for 2011 was at the Tirohanga Camp near Mosgiel. Bart Gilmore, Andrew Frazier, Dave Kennedy and Stan Zwies made up the team for this project. A second hand kitchen was altered and installed in the Camp Manager's house. Three cabins got a make-over and a commercial stainless steel range hood and extractor fan were installed in the camp kitchen. New rules and regulations have meant many camps are required to enlarge their bunk beds. The Frazier family stayed on after the others left to complete the making of the new bunks, see photo above.

From late January a team worked at the KingsView School in Frankton, Queenstown. Bart and Muriel Gilmore, Peter Fitzgerald, Andrew and Tracy Frazier, David and Joy Kennedy and Stan Zwies worked hard to get the jobs done to prepare the school for opening on 7th February. The task was to refurbish an old hotel into suitable classrooms, offices and toilets for the Christian School. Mostly the team worked in the pre-school area installing insulation, lining walls and other maintenance jobs. In the main school area they helped the main contractor as required, fitting door handles, making display boards and generally tidying the area ready for the new school year. A 2 bedroom house was provided for the Frazier family at the nearby motor camp and team meals etc were held there. All the other team members had their own mobile homes and parked on a property 5 Kms away.



The next project was at YWAM, Oxford near Christchurch. The team had to pull down an old verandah and fire escapes and replace these. They also installed a new toilet/shower and built additional partitions to create more bedrooms in the 'Hyatt' building. Fiji

There have been tropical storms almost every afternoon since our return and the roads have been badly scoured by water and heavy trucks. We have been to Lami to meet with Alfred Powell to make plans for further work on the Lami Gospel Project. They have already used the Church building for several functions, including a Young Adults "Valentine Evening". How lovely it looked with the poles dressed with banana leaves, fabrics draped over the verandah beams and candlelight tables. The next big event will be Leilani's wedding (on 23rd April), which is planned to be held in the main auditorium. What a fitting celebration for Pastor



Alfred and Lute Powell to see their daughter married in the church that has been a 20 year vision for them. Needless to say there are a lot of smaller things that it would be nice to have completed by then.

All going well, by the time you read this, Bill will be supervising the students (pictured at the bottom of page 5) of NCTC (Northern Christian Training Centre) in Labasa to build an all purpose classroom facility. Labasa has experienced severe flooding during February, so we hope that it will be dry enough to commence this project on schedule. Frank Luita from Savusavu will also be joining us.

We have also visited another possible new project in Momi (20 km east of Nadi) for the Agape Trust, to help them complete an education/community outreach centre in the rural (predominantly Indian) community. Photo at right. They already have an established fish farm (see photo top right) and have planted crops (pineapples, citrus, cassava, potatoes etc) in an effort to become self-supporting. The most immediate work to be done is plastering (lots of it!), also painting, electrical and plumbing. They are looking for teams to come and assist with this project as soon as they are available.

We have heard that HIM (His International Mission) in Lautoka have a builder who has committed to project manage their very large project to build an all-purpose community building and school classrooms. He is due to arrive in August and there is every possibility they will be ready for an MMM team in September. So, for those of you contemplating being part of a short-term Work Team to Fiji this year, there are a variety of projects to choose from. Poverty can be reduced when we focus on helping others create wealth

Steel Roll-Forming Machine to produce steel framed houses [see photos]

Many people in Zambia live in substandard housing, much of which is badly affected by the ravages of the wet season. Often families will commence construction using mud bricks and fail to get the roof on before the rain starts. This results in collapsed and washed-away walls.

Through the provision of the roll forming machine MMM Zambia is creating employment and providing low cost steel frame structures. The frames create a strong and durable framework which is weather resistant. Our graduates have been given the opportunity to work alongside affected communities to assemble these houses. A team of six, who were among the ten which Noel Taylor from MMM Australia trained, have now set up a company to assemble and finish structures produced by the MMM Zambia Roll Form Team. Our focus is to produce the frames and the graduates' company are contracted to assemble them and do the finishing aspects. So we are not only providing steel frame houses we are also providing employment opportunities. Every frame made gives someone proper shelter as well as helping someone feed a family.

Translating Skills into wealth

MMM Zambia runs a Vocational Training Centre (VTC) and has trained and graduated over 1000 people during a period of 10 years. Some of these graduates are in stable employment, others have combined their training skills and entrepreneurship and have set up their own small scale enterprises, while others through the Employment Creation Program established by the VTC, have managed to work in teams on various projects and are able to raise capital to set up their own business.

Andrew Chitanika, a graduate of 2002, is now the Director of Endless Contractors. Established in Lusaka the capital city, Andrew has enough work to keep him busy. He also creates opportunities for current students to experience 'hands on' in the real construction world during their school break. He is also one of the sponsors for students who are struggling with school fees and graduate tool kits. Andrew comes from a very humble background, he sponsored a brother to go through the training and he has committed himself to helping others make a difference in their lives.

Sydney Chimoto, a graduate of 2008 is married to **Mwansa Mubanga**, also a graduate of 2008 and together they formed a construction company. Sydney is also a maintenance manager for a major shopping centre in the city of Lusaka. They are both working hard to find a location for their newly established construction company.

Student Tool Kit

With the growing number of graduates, the 'Tool Kit' concept has been a great challenge. Previously students were given a set of basic tools at their graduation. The Centre has now introduced a 'bring your own Tool Kit' concept. The idea is great but has left a lot of the students struggling to have the most needed or essential tools. We have been encouraging local companies and graduates to help by gifting Tool Kits to outstanding students and we are grateful to all



those that have assisted. As many of you know, Zambia has a high unemployment rate. The Tool Kit program creates an opportunity for the graduates to set up their own enterprises with less headaches of where to get the tools. These graduates who have been assisted are doing extremely well and are able to employ others.



Prayer Answered

The Interlocking Brick machine. This has been a timely gift from God through the Rotary Club. A double chamber, diesel powered Brick Making machine worth US\$33,000.00 brand new, has been donated to the MMM VTC. God has amazing ways to meet His people's needs. Now with the combination of the steel roll forming machine we are able to put up steel frames and build with the interlocking bricks manufactured by the brick machine. The machine is on wheels and can be towed to any construction site. The Rotary Club is now working on raising funds for a vehicle which will be able to carry students and tow the machine. We are confident that by June there will be a vehicle to meet these needs.

This whole experience just reminds us of the words of Hudson Taylor, pioneer of mission work in China: "AS SMALL AS WE MAY BE, WE ARE BIG IN THE HEARTS OF THOSE WE HAVE TOUCHED."

DETERMINED TO ACHIEVE

The VTC 'chapel time' is working through the theme "Determined to Achieve". The purpose is to encourage the students and staff to be focussed and disciplined as they work towards a common goal. One of the students from the construction class had this to say after four weeks in training:

"I'm determined to achieve. A lot of people fail to reach their full potential simply because they lack this important virtue. The difference between individuals who make it in life and those who fail to do so comes down to the fact that some lead disciplined lives while others fail to do so. It is impossible to achieve anything significant in life if we lack self-discipline. Self discipline is a result of training that focuses the mind and character with the overall goal of attaining personal improvements. As a result nothing whatsoever is capable of moving or distracting those who are self disciplined. Along the road to achievement, there are adversities and all sorts of bumps and road blocks to hinder us from achieving our goals. The road is not smooth. No matter how many times we fall, the key is to pick ourselves up and continue moving forward. To do this, we need strength, not a kind that comes from within ourselves but that which comes from our Creator. In order to achieve, we need to accept the fact that hard work is the road which leads to achievement. There are no short cuts or alternative roads that lead to a point of achievement. Hard work is a noble task and it brings dignity to one's life. The Bible says "All hard work brings a profit, but mere talk leads only to poverty" (Proverbs 14:23). This passage demonstrates that those who work hard will be rewarded; on the contrary those who are lazy will become poor. Similarly, in 2 Thessalonians 3:10 we come across the fact that "if a man refuses to work, he shall not eat". The key is hard work; another key is more hard work. Hard work brings dignity. If we fail to work hard, we shall forever be dependant on other people. There is no dignity in being a beggar, believe you me. So in short, work is a means established by God through which human beings are able to earn their living. In fact, hard work is the only means ordained by God whereby people may gain wealth. So it is very important that we are disciplined to work hard.

Time management is another discipline we need to develop in ourselves. Once time is lost, it is lost forever. A lot of people hold the view that one of the reasons why most Zambians are poor is because they do not know how to utilize time properly. All of us have twenty four hours in a day. It is how we use these twenty four hours which matters. This whole idea of 'Zambian time' must be abandoned. It has a negative impact on our lives. Time is a precious gift from God and because of this; we need to guard it seriously. I believe we shall give an account to God concerning how we make use of it. Time management is about seizing our opportunities and making use of them properly. How we use time today has implications on our future, for this reason let us seize this opportunity and achieve that which we are here to achieve. I believe opportunities only come once. When I sat down to analyse the Construction Management class, I come to a strong conviction that it was God who directed each one of us here. It was God who made it possible for us to be here. Personally, being here is an answered prayer. Let's make 'He who made it possible for us to be here' - proud. Let's seize this opportunity, Let's be "Determined to achieve". God Bless You All,
