LETTER FROM THE

Director

At the MMM NZ's 30th Anniversary conference my wife, Ave and I were presented with a certificate for 25 years of service with MMM. We didn't intend it to be that long! When we packed our household goods and moved our family into our freshly renovated house bus we were off for a "couple of years", so we told our faithful supporters and friends.

Why would you do that? Why would you serve in a ministry for 25 years?

Well, here are a few reasons and I could list more -

There was a need, and we could fill it. I had it on my heart to be a builder and use those skills for God since I was nine years old and my Dad went to Fiji to help build a classroom at a Christian school. Years later when I heard of Mobile Mission Maintenance, I knew this was a ministry I could be of use to, with the skills I had.

Serving in a ministry that encourages others ... is encouraging! Scriptures like, "Do good to all men, especially those in the household of faith," and "Always give yourself fully to the work of the Lord, for your labour in the Lord is not in vain," encouraged us to be intentional in what we give our time to. What is difficult for people to understand is that the opportunities MMM offers to support other ministries encourages the givers and the receivers! This lifestyle must be experienced to be believed! We have also grown to love the way the ministry of MMM brings people together to bless others – that's God's family

We have found God faithful. When we began in ministry, our three kids were aged from four years old to six months old. With moving every few weeks, how would we meet the needs of our family? We didn't – God did, providing friends, doctors and education support when they needed it, and all our financial needs. After five years of life on the road, we moved to Hong Kong for eight years and led the MMM HK ministry before returning to serve with MMM New Zealand with teenagers, who are now grown and married. By keeping our eyes on God, he has provided what we needed and more, including the opportunity to travel around our beautiful country and some of his incredible world.

A long serving missionary friend of ours once said, "Mission life is so interesting, I don't know why more people don't do it!" We agree, why not trust God?






We watched a presentation tracing the history of MMM NZ from its early days and enjoyed a cake beautifully made by Ave and Howard.

East West College, Hamilton is the training arm of WEC mission. You don't have to be going out on the mission field with WEC to attend this college but many of the students do. When the team arrived there, Marty and Robyn got to park their

caravan next to the day care centre. They had children's laughter and birds singing; it was such a happy place. The project was to work with their painter to prepare and paint their auditorium from top to bottom. It had a really high ceiling and multiple windows and doors. Lots of masking to do before painting, and lots of cutting in. It was such a great atmosphere though, with people constantly popping in to say, "Hi," and



encourage us in our work. We were able to finish this quickly, so we moved on to two other jobs. Lejf and his team,

which included a number of EastWest staff went from roof-to-roof de-nailing then rescrewing the roofing iron, while Marty and Robyn with the very timely help of Steven prepared and painted the student lounge.

Of course, we can't go past an MMM project without mentioning the food. We joined with the staff and students at morning tea and lunch which was yum, but we were also able to join their devotion and prayer times. It was great to be included in the life of the college and get to know many of the students and learn of their visions for their future in missions.

Belfast Elim, Christchurch

This project was primarily a painting job, although, as with all MMM jobs, there were some other tasks that needed doing that were more building-related. We arrived around lunchtime Thursday, with Gerrard and Femmy arriving not long after us. Femmy soon got motivated into stripping wallpaper almost immediately. Then we had others turn up, keen to start prepping and painting.

The pastor briefed us that the work was to freshen things up and keep the church looking spick and span for five more years until a rebuild, so we focused on freshening up rather than repairing everything.

Another helper, now a social worker at the church, joined us. He had enjoyed working with our team at a previous camp and mentioned that if all MMM jobs were like this, he'd join more projects. That was really encouraging.

You hope that when people join our teams, it creates momentum and inspires new members to get involved, keep up with the projects, and sign up for future ones.

We were billeted with good friends from the church. One had been a doctor in our town, so staying with them felt special. During their weekly Bible study, we shared about our MMM journey, hoping to inspire others. Afterward, someone said, "You guys are like gypsies," which we hope was a compliment!

A volunteer helped install a dishwasher, and we found a new front door for \$695 at a secondhand shop. A previous quote for a new installation had been around \$10,000, so the church was thrilled with the savings.



At the end of our time in Belfast, the church looked amazing. It was really brightened and refreshed, and as new pastors were about to take over the church's leadership, it was great to see it in pristine condition for them. Orama, Great Barrier Island

We appreciate all those who share their stories with us, the following is from Allison Le Heux who, along with her husband Daniel, served on the Orama project. Thank you Allison!

In October, my husband and I spent 10 days working on an MMM project at Orama, Great Barrier Island. We had read about the need for volunteers for this team in the MMM newsletter. The team leader, Malcolm McAlistair, emailed us all the information we needed, and the Orama team assisted us with accommodation onsite and with flight bookings. Thus, we felt well prepared for our trip.

We really enjoyed the 20 min flight in a tiny 4-seater plane to the Island from North Shore Airport. We were met and taken to Orama, a beautiful scenic 40-minute drive. Malcolm and the three others on the MMM work party at that time, and the Orama community were all friendly and welcoming.

After a short orientation to the work, I was keen to get busy. During our time there, we were mainly redecorating a three-bedroom accommodation unit near the beach with a beautiful view out to sea; a very pleasant worksite. I helped with sanding, undercoating, painting the skirtings and cutting in for the other team members to roll the walls. I had painted before so I could use those skills but I found I learnt a lot working in such a kind supportive team. I learnt to paint internal doors, three coats of paint each side on four doors gave me lots of practice as we worked together. It was really satisfying work. Since we have to been home, I have put these skills to good use. I have independently painted a small bedroom. A first for me!

Another highlight was the delicious morning teas and meals at Orama - good food and good company. The devotion time and prayer time at morning tea was a special part of the day.

We really enjoyed a day out with the team exploring some of the Island, on narrow, winding roads through bush and open country. We walked along beautiful windswept beaches, and visited an art gallery and coffee shop.

We loved wandering around the beach at Orama, made it up to a lookout for amazing views and kayaked around the bay. The sunsets were amazing!

MMM FIJI

MMM Fiji continues to thrive with regular teams, seeing buildings and facilities greatly improved, ministries encouraged and lives changed as people sacrifice their time and

money to step out of their comfort zone and serve in Fiji.

In October we had a fantastic team from Morrinsville Baptist partner with us at The Kennedy Centre, a retreat and training centre south of Nadi owned by Evangelism Explosion. They host both local and international teams for evangelism training as well as other local groups. The team spent their time rebuilding the main entrance stairway, path and deck to the hall, replacing rotten decking and repairing the foundations of a building that was unused because of the state of the building. It is always encouraging to see the transformation we can achieve at local Fijian ministries by having teams partner with us.

In November, we had a team of action come to Oasis Farm to rebuild a house badly damaged by termites before a cyclone comes. At the MMM NZ Conference we promoted "Oasis Farm", the land

that MMM Fiji has committed to purchasing, and talked about this specific need it had. We had four guys put up their hands to come. They worked alongside a team of locals who worked incredibly hard from early in the morning until dark each day. They were able to completely demolish and rebuild the termite damaged part of the farm house. This is a massive blessing to the family living there knowing their home will be safe in a cyclone. God continues to bless us with the right volunteers for every project and amazes us with the way the finances come together, as people are obedient to God given opportunities to give generously. We are grateful to have a growing team of local guys working with us while being trained in building skills and discipled. We are excited by the growth we have seen in MMM Fiji this year and the projects we have accomplished. However, we still constantly see so much need all around us and pray God continues to bring the right people to join our team at the right time.

There is a lot of work that happens behind the scenes to get teams on projects in Fiji. We are still searching for the right person who has the heart to serve MMM by helping to administrate the teams coming to Fiji from New Zealand. Maybe you don't have a trade, but administration and communication is more your thing. If so, please get in touch as we would love to hear from you.
